§ 132.001. UNSWORN DECLARATION

(a) Except as provided by Subsection (b), an unsworn declaration may be used in lieu of a written sworn declaration, verification, certification, oath, or affidavit required by statute or required by a rule, order, or requirement adopted as provided by law.

(b) This section does not apply to an oath of office or an oath required to be taken before a specified official other than a notary public.

(c) An unsworn declaration made under this section must be:

(1) in writing; and

(2) subscribed by the person making the declaration as true under penalty of perjury $% \left({\left[{{{\rm{c}}} \right]_{{\rm{c}}}} \right)$

(d) Except as provided by Subsection \in , an unsworn declaration made under this section must include a jurat in substantially the following form:
